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solidarity the reciprocal relations of trust and obligation between citizens that are essential for a thriving polity is a basic goal of all political communities yet it is extremely difficult to achieve especially in multiracial societies in an era of increasing global migration and democratization that issue is more pressing than perhaps ever before political theorists have long wrestled with the topic but they have typically addressed it from within the framework of liberal theory how can a multicultural and multiracial polity with all of the different allegiances inherent in it be transformed into a unified liberal one juliet hooker flips

this question around difference she argues is inevitable in multiracial societies and liberalism offers inadequate prescriptions for making it less divisive instead the social fact of difference itself should be the starting point how can we create political solidarity when multiracialism and multiculturalism is more or less permanent unlike most liberal theorists who focus on nationality and culture hooker stresses the differences produced by race and explores the role that it plays in both the united states and latin america coming to terms with the lasting power of racial identity she contends is the starting point for any political project attempting to achieve solidarity

in highlighting the crucial contributions of diasporic people to british cultural production this important collection defamiliarizes prevailing descriptions of romanticism as the expression of a national character or culture the contributors approach the period from the perspective of the atlantic maritime economy making a strong case for viewing british romanticism as the effect of myriad economic and cultural exchanges occurring throughout a circum atlantic world driven by an insatiable hunger for sugar and slaves typically taken for granted the material contributions of slaves sailors and servants shaped romanticism both in spite of and because of the severe conditions they experienced throughout the atlantic world the essays range from sierra leone to jamaica to nova scotia to the metropole examining not only the desperate circumstances of diasporic peoples but also the extraordinary force of their creativity and resistance of particular importance is the emergence of race as a category of identity class and containment race romanticism and the atlantic explores that process both economically and theoretically showing how race ensures the persistence of servitude after abolition at the same time the collection never loses sight of the extraordinary contributions diasporic peoples made to british culture during the romantic era

racism in the united states is institutionalized and has been since the early days of the republic eliminating racism would produce a different society than we now know race and ideology reveals how various strands of racial thinking and behavior are crucial for maintaining the unequal distribution of wealth that is more pronounced in the u s than in any other advanced industrial country though primarily concerned with the u s this collection contains chapters on other societies in order to highlight commonalties and the global nature of the race color problem

in race a philosophical introduction second edition paul c taylor provides an accessible guide to a well travelled but still mysterious area of the contemporary social landscape as in the first edition the book blends metaphysics and social philosophy analytic philosophy and pragmatic philosophy of experience in this thoroughly updated and revised volume taylor outlines the main features and implications of race thinking while engaging the ideas of such important figures as linda alcoff k anthony appiah w e b du bois michel foucault sally haslanger and howard winant the result is a comprehensive but accessible introduction to philosophical race theory and to a non biological and situational notion of race the book unfolds in a sequence of five chapters each devoted to one of the

following questions what is race thinking don t we know better than to talk about race now are there any races what is it like to have a racial identity and how important ethically is colorblindness on the way to answering these questions race takes up topics like mixed race identity white supremacy the relationship between the race concept and other social identity categories and the impact of race thinking on our erotic and romantic lives the second edition s new concluding chapter explores the racially fraught issues of policing immigration and global justice and interrogates the thought that barack obama has ushered in a post racial age this volume is suitable for the educated general reader as well as for students and scholars in ethnic studies philosophy sociology and other related fields

a country of strangers is a magnificent exploration of the psychological landscape where blacks and whites meet to tell the story in human rather than abstract terms the pulitzer prize winning writer david k shipler bypasses both extremists and celebrities and takes us among ordinary americans as they encounter one another across racial lines we learn how blacks and whites see each other how they interpret each other s behavior and how certain damaging images and assumptions seep into the actions of even the most unbiased we penetrate into dimensions of stereotyping and discrimination that are usually invisible and discover the unseen prejudices and privileges of white americans and what black americans make of them we explore the competing impulses of integration and separation the reference points by which the races navigate as they venture out and then withdraw the biculturalism that many blacks perfect as they move back and forth between the white and black worlds and the homesickness some blacks feel for the comfort of all black separateness there are portrayals of interracial families and their multiracial children expert guides through the clashes created by racial blending in america we see how whites and blacks each carry the burden of our history black white stereotypes are dissected the physical bodies that we see the mental qualities we imagine the moral character we attribute to others and to ourselves the violence we fear the power we seek or are loath to relinquish the book makes clear that we have the ability to shape our racial landscape to reconstruct even if not perfectly the texture of our relationships there is an assessment of the complexity confronting blacks and whites alike as they struggle to recognize and define the racial motivations that may or may not be present in a thought a word a deed the book does not prescribe but it documents the silences that prevail the listening that doesn t happen the conversations that don t take place it looks at relations between minorities including blacks and jews and blacks and koreans it explores the human dimensions of affirmative action the intricate contacts and misunderstandings across racial lines among coworkers and neighbors it is unstinting in its criticism of our society s failure to come to grips with bigotry but it is also happily crowded

with black people and white people who struggle in their daily lives to do just that a remarkable book that will stimulate each of us to reexamine and better understand our own deepest attitudes in regard to race in america
